TEC's move into the Jane M. Hiler Facility last November opened the doors to a beautiful new home and the making of new friendships. One exciting happening was the advent of a new program launched in May 2022 called Mane Event. The program meets once a month, May through October, and includes aspects of horse care, riding, and building trusting relationships with our horse companions. Groups are limited to two or three participants to allow for individualized instruction, and each group is taught by a TEC instructor.

The participants choose what they want to learn at their meetings, as well as what they want to call themselves. The current group decided on the name "The Dynamic Duos" or "Double D's", then applied temporary tattoos to make their membership official.

One thing the Double D's wanted to learn about was checking a horse's vital signs. Using Nellie and Trixie as the stoic patients, the two men were led by TEC Instructor, Marilyn Bubula Harvey, on the use of a stethoscope to hear the beating of the heart, counting breaths by observing the horses' flank movement. and looking at the color of gums in the four-legged patients to assess their health.

Scott enjoys the learning and activities included in each session. He likes grooming his horse, and is especially enjoying his newly-learned skill of cleaning the equipment. Scott reports that being around the horses relaxes him and says his time spent at TEC has "been therapeutic". He particularly likes the longer time with the horses, since each session lasts 2 ½ hours.

Mark C. reported that Mane Event has given him something new to look forward to. With the help of his communication board, Mark

shared how he enjoys the educational side of the program and the games that he can play with the volunteers and with his roommates. Mark likes that the program offers him activities where he is able to use his hands and learn other motor skills.

#### **Meet Some of our Invaluable Volunteers**

Sixteen-year-old Ilijan Jarnjak enjoys walking, painting miniatures, and playing video games with friends. He also serves as Student Council Secretary at Grace Christian School. Three years ago, he added to his resume volunteering at TEC. His sister was taking lessons, the crew asked him to help out, and he has been filling water buckets, cleaning stalls, and feeding hav ever since.

Those three years have confirmed Ilijan's initial impression of TEC: "a nice place with nice people". In fact, working with the supervisors is his favorite part of the job. He fondly recalls a day when his cousin showed up to help, and they got to throw hay down from the loft to put in the store room. It kept them super busy, made the time fly by, and they had fun to boot.

Like most workers at TEC, Ilijan feels the greatest need there is "volunteers who keep volunteering". He says that people at TEC are doing good work, and they need help to keep doing it. His advice to anyone considering volunteering would be to wear an old pair of jeans and invest in a pair of boots just for the barn!

After retiring from the corporate world in Texas and returning to her hometown of Niles last year, Elaine Fulbright began a search for volunteer opportunities. She attended a TEC volunteer orientation, recognized a well-run organization when she saw one, and started helping at the barn in March. Elaine has always loved horses, and has had three of her own over the years. But because she has asthma and is unable to sidewalk for lessons, she helps take care of the horses two days a week, which she finds fun and relaxing. In addition to the horses, she enjoys her fellow volunteers and says that because they want to be there they always have a good attitude which, of course, makes it even more fun to be there and the work go fast.

Elaine says to the people who are always thanking her for the time she puts in at TEC, "You don't need to thank me; I'm having a good time here!" As for others who are considering volunteering? "I'm 73, I can now lift a 50-pound bale of hay by myself, and I've even learned to drive a tractor!! What more could a person want?"

When a long-ago memory of horse camp sparked in Brittany Ego a desire to combine her love of animals with volunteering alongside other people, a Google search led her to therapeutic riding and, eventually, to TEC. She began working as a sidewalker in lessons, is now acting as both a leader and a ring assistant, and is even in the process of becoming a PATH-certified instructor! She has thrived in the structured and well-organized environment, and has found that the learning, the relationships, and the "I Did It!" moments are therapeutic for her, and keep her coming back week after week. As she describes it, "Once I walk through the barn door I'm in a different world and can focus on me, my horse, and my rider."

Brittany sees TEC's greatest need as more hands. She says "You don't have to be a horse expert to volunteer, and it's so much more fun than it is work. If you're thinking about it, come observe a lesson and see if it's something you might like before jumping in. Come take a tour, meet the horses, meet some of the volunteers. Then try it!"



#### Get to Know the New "Kid"



TEC welcomed our newest four-legged family member, Trixie, to the barn in March. Trixie is 20-ish year old pony mare who had been purchased by her previous owners to be a gestational carrier (surrogate mom) for a mare who was not able to carry foals. When it became apparent Trixie was not in foal she was sold to a different family, but was soon returned to her previous owners because the family didn't like her color. That greyish-tan color, known as "smoky buckskin", actually makes her a standout among the much more common bays and chestnuts of the horse world.

When Trixie came to TEC she was in need of some conditioning, but she had a very kind eye. It was the sweetness in Trixie's eyes that convinced Margie H., Ron H., and Debbie K. to bring her from southern Indiana to TEC to see if she had the makings of a therapy horse. A few groceries, lots of affectionate grooming, and some much needed exercise have turned Trixie from an ugly duckling into a beautiful girl who is loved by many. Now her coat reflects the sunshine and her chunky belly reflects her love of treats.

Trixie's fan base includes the instructors, the participants and their families, as well as the chore volunteers. Everyone who interacts with Trixie feels her warmth, goodness, and quiet kindness. One instructor has said of her, "Trixie is worth her weight in gold". Another instructor has described Trixie as "the perfect horse to work with our smaller participants to gain confidence, build muscle strength, and improve riding skills".

Trixie's willingness and gentle participation is already helping the smallest TEC riders discover "I Did It!" moments. The smiles on those riders' faces make clear that when it comes to being a therapeutic riding horse, Trixie has reached her stride.


